SALLY BELL has been the Engineering Faculty Librarian, with additional responsibility for research support, at the University of Strathclyde since 2012. Previous posts include roles at BBC Scotland, the Glasgow Herald and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde, building a broad spectrum of knowledge of reference services. Sally has previously spoken at Relationship Management in HE Libraries in 2015 about research support and introduced the delegates at ARCLIB 2016 to making podcasts. Her work in statistical analysis of serials stems from an interest in evidence-based collection management for electronic library resources.

JILL EMERY is the Collection Development & Management Librarian at Portland State University Library in Oregon. She has held leadership positions in ALA ALCTS, ER&L and NASIG. In 2015 she was appointed as the ALA-NISO representative to vote on NISO/ISO standards on behalf of the American Library Association. She also serves on the Project COUNTER Executive Committee. Lastly, she is co-editor of the open access journal Collaborative Librarianship with Michael Levine-Clark.

MARTHA FOGG is Publishing Director at Adam Matthew, an award-winning publisher of online primary source collections. Martha has edited and developed a wide range of primary source collections including *Mass Observation Online*. In her role as Publishing Director she has worked with a wide range of special collection libraries and archives, including the National Archives, the British Library, the Harry Ransom Humanities Research Center and the British Film Institute (BFI). Martha was educated at University College London (BA English Literature, 2003) and Royal Holloway, University of London (MA Victorian Literature, Art and Culture, 2005).

PAOLA MARCHIONNI is Head of digital resources for teaching, learning and research at Jisc. She has overall responsibility for a number of services and projects aimed at improving access to digital collections of primary source material to enable new research, teaching and learning, such as Historical Texts and Journal Archives.
