

- Leading scholar-led, non-profit Open Access press
- Founded in 2008 in Cambridge
- Mission-driven: make high-quality academic books freely available everywhere

No charges to readers <u>or authors</u>

Our books

- 40-50 peer-reviewed books per year
- All immediate OA:
 - Creative Commons licence
 - No embargo
 - Free PDF, HTML editions; paid-for paperback, hardback, EPUB
- Accessed worldwide over 80,000 times each month
- Prizewinning, innovative
- Available via open platforms and sales routes
 - Google Scholar, OAPEN, Open Edition etc
 - Amazon, our website, bookshops, museums etc



Library Membership Programme



- Over 270 library members
- Libraries pay an annual fee for membership (tiered) (£300-700)
- Free, perpetual access to our digital editions for anyone on the network, plus discounts on paper copies
- Metadata, outreach
- Collective approaches taken up by other publishers, e.g. Opening the Future; MIT Press
- Funding OA books for everyone

Costs and revenue




Publishing costs

We publish between 40-50 books per year. Our average costs per title (updated in 2022) are as follows:

Final proofreading and indexing	£2,100
Typesetting	£1000
Cover design	£150
Generating digital editions & website maintenance	£350
Distribution and retailing	£300
Marketing	£500
Overheads	£1,100
Total	£5,500

A number of revenue streams cover our costs. The figures below are from our most recent complete financial year (2022-2023), during which we published 49 titles (35 monographs, 15 edited volumes and 2 textbooks):

OBP Revenue 2022-2023 (GBP£)




Library support is vital for Diamond OA to work



- A viable alternative to paying BPCs forever!
- Other presses using this approach: punctum books, Open Book Collective, Opening the Future, T&F, Bloomsbury, MIT




